From the President.....

On May 14, Johnston's future met Johnston's past. Students from Mrs. Mahoney's eight grade Community Service Learning class worked along side of Society and Johnston **Public** members Works employees in the three cemeteries: Ridgedale. Johnston Valley View and Kinsey/Lawson. Another group of students from the same class worked last fall at cleaning up and planting bulbs at Ridgedale cemetery.

Besides raking, trimming and pulling weeds, the students also learned about some of the ancestors of Society members buried in the old graveyards.

Ezekiel Hunt, the first white settler to come to Jefferson township in 1846, is buried n Ridgedale. Ezekiel is the great, great grandfather of Ferne Michael. Ridgedale cemetery was originally known as the Hunt family burial ground. It was dedicated in 1856.

Valley View cemetery, overlooking Camp Dodge, was the site for McClain family burials. The original McClain, J.D., came to Jefferson township in 1848 McClain was an assessor and also a justice of the peace for the area.

The Lawson and Kinsey families were early settlers in Webster township. John Lawson, for whom the Lawson Elementary School is named, donated the land for the first school in the area. The cemetery is adjacent to the Kinsey "homeplace".

The students could understand a little better the hardships of the pioneer families, after seeing some of the gravestones of the young children that didn't survive before antibiotics were discovered. It is hoped that this partnership will continue - a worthwhile experience for everyone.

On The School Bus Route: Following up.....

In the November 1998 and January 1999 Newsletters, we printed parts of a poem written in 1916 about his horse-drawn school-bus route by driver Charlie Hammond. (Charlie's route took him from just east of Merle Hay Road on Meredith Drive, down Meredith Drive to 86th Street, and thence north to 54th Avenue, and east to 72nd Street). Charlie gave only the first name of children he took to school, and we wondered who they all were.

Gladys Kuefner was one of those children, and she remembers who most of them were, and where they lived.

First were George and Forest; they would have lived on Meredith, east of Merle Hay. We're not sure of these two. But Judy Bogaard thinks that the next, Helen, was her mother Virginia's cousin, Helen Keyte. Her brothers were Ben and Kenneth. Next on the route was Louise Pieckenbrock.

Moving west along Meredith Drive, we come to Sybel Michael., and further on, Anna Dunn.

We pass the churchyard-- now McDivitt Cemetery, and then pick up Hazel and Earl Stemler. There were a number of Stuart households-- four brothers (Mark, Ray, Rufus and Warren) along the way, and from these families, the bus picked up Harold and Earl Stuart, and Harvey and Harland Stuart.

Next on the route was Dorothy Parmetter, and another Stuart, Virgina, out near Meredith and 86th Street. The bus continued north on 86th Street and then east on 54th Avenue, and picked up Gladys Kuefner. The Wilson children were Evelyn, Alice, Leland and Gerald-- at this stop "we nearly always wait"!!


They continued east down "the timber road", 54th Avenue. and came to another Kuefner, where Herbert Kuefner and Agnes got on the bus. At this point, the horse-drawn bus turned north, and had to cross bridges and, in wet seasons, mud holes as it moved up 72nd Street to where it joined 62nd Avenue. It then continued east down to the Johnston Consolidated School.

A deserted School House, the Friar School, was located where 72nd Street intersected 62nd Avenue (Johnston Road). Gladys Kuefner remembers that she began her schooling in the Friar school. It closed when the district consolidated in 1915. Other schools in this area were the Ryder school at

the south-west corner of 100th Street and Meredith Drive, and Valley School, located along N.W. Beaver Drive at the site of what is now the Lloyd Busby residence. The Ridgedale school was on Beaver Drive, across from the Hyperion Field Club.

Charlie Hammond's bus route is a route we can follow today, save for the north part of 72nd Street, which no longer continues across Beaver Creek through to 62nd Ave.
